Recent Awards



THANK YOU, RSN Investors!

RSN is experiencing significant program growth, particularly in Orange County, and is on pace to serve twice as many youth this year. Since July 2024, we have received 25 referrals and supported 13 participants in Individual Skill Building. We recently received several awards from local government and foundation partners in reflection of our model's success and the urgent need for our services in Orange and Chatham counties.

Chatham County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council has made a significant commitment to support expansion of our Individual Skill Building and Enrichment Activities in Chatham County.

Similarly, Orange County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council has also awarded us a grant to support our growth in Orange County. We are also recipients of funds from the Orange County Opioid Settlement, which will be aimed at integrating harm reduction principles and providing overdose prevention training to staff and mentors in addition to continuing to implement our Family Resilience framework. Finally, we are grateful to Coastal Credit Union Foundation who will partner on expanding our financial literacy enrichment activities and further empower us to expand our reach. These funders are helping ensure more young people have the tools and support to thrive, and we are grateful for their investments in RSN.
